## Phase 11



### ABOUT BOMCA

In February 2026, the Border Management Programme in Central Asia (BOMCA) entered into its eleventh phase (BOMCA 11) with an overall budget of EUR 12 million and the implementation period of 40 months.

Since its launch in 2003, the BOMCA programme has focused on capacity building and institutional development of the Central Asian border agencies, developing trade corridors and the facilitation of trade, improving border management systems and eliminating drug trafficking across the Central Asian region. Each new phase of BOMCA was designed to gradually build upon and consolidate the results achieved during the preceding phases. Since BOMCA 10 phase, border communities are actively involved in implementation, seeking to improve cross-border cooperation and trust.

BOMCA 11 is aimed at further advancing regional cross-border cooperation, tackling organised crime and improving living conditions for border regions' population by applying integrated border management approach and gender-balanced and human-rights centred principles.

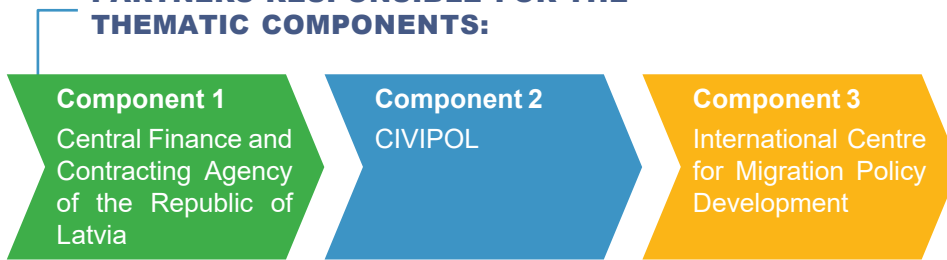
The achievement of the overall objective will be ensured by the means of the three specific objectives matching to the corresponding components of the programme:

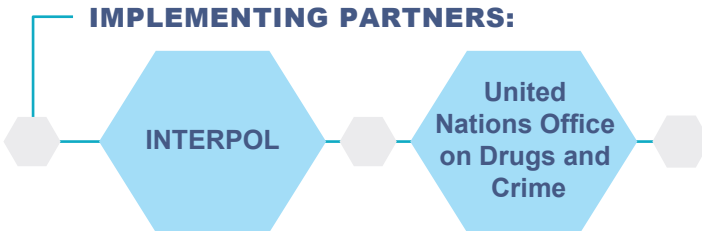
## WHO WE ARE

The BOMCA programme leadership and overall strategic, administrative and financial management of the project is based at the International Centre for Migration Policy Development.

BOMCA regional structure consists of BOMCA Regional Office in Bishkek (Kyrgyzstan) and national positions across five Central Asian countries (Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan).

## TARGET GROUPS AND FINAL BENEFICIARIES

The BOMCA programme foresees the active involvement of various target groups across all five Central Asian countries, in accordance with the specific focus of each programme component. Components 1 and 2, which aim to strengthen institutional capacities of border and law enforcement agencies in cross-border cooperation, information exchange and overall border security, primarily engage the Ministries of Internal Affairs, border management authorities, security services, customs and other relevant central agencies. Component 3 focuses on facilitating cross-border development and improving living conditions in border regions and engages a broader range of actors, including local government authorities, public service providers and civil society organisations.

The final beneficiaries are the general population of the Central Asian countries, with a particular focus on communities living in border areas, migrants (including vulnerable categories such as women, minors, and victims of human trafficking), entrepreneurs and traders, passengers and travellers, civil society organisations and community groups.
